

HIGHER CERTIFICATE STUDIES

Minimum NSC entry requirements for this qualification level

Pass the NSC, with a minimum of **30%** in the language of learning & teaching of the institution together with any other university requirements.

DIPLOMA STUDIES

Minimum NSC entry requirements for this qualification level

Pass the NSC, with a minimum of 30% in the language of learning and teaching, coupled with an achievement rating of **3** (40–49%) or better, in four recognised NSC 20-credit subjects, together with any other university requirements.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE STUDIES

Minimum NSC entry requirements for this qualification level

Pass the NSC, with a minimum of **30%** in the language of learning and teaching, coupled with an achievement rating of **4 (50–59%)** or better, in four NSC 20-credit subjects together with any other university requirements.

How Do I Apply?

- Apply online (<u>www.mandela.ac.za</u>) you will need a valid email account + a reliable cell phone number.
- Online applications **OPEN** in **May** and remember to complete both **Part 1 & Part 2**.
- There is **NO** application fee for SA citizens.
- Ensure that you **meet** the <u>minimum Applicant Score (AS)</u> and <u>subject requirements</u> before submitting **your completed application form** and **supporting documentation**.

Important documentation You need to submit the following:

- 1. Certified copy of your **ID**.
- Certified copy of your latest school results (Grade 11 final, or Grade 12 June/September results, or final school leaving certificate).
- Declaration by your parent / legal guardian / surety form (form downloaded from the University website);
- 4. Certified **copy** of your parent / legal guardian / surety's **ID**;
- 5. Proof of your current residential / home or postal address

NB: Your application form will be delayed if you <u>DO NOT</u> include all you supporting docs with your application form.



How to calculate your Applicant Score (AS)

- YOUR **Applicant Score (AS)** will be different if you took **Maths, Maths Literacy** or **Technical Maths** at school.
- Your Applicant Score (AS) is calculated using <u>six</u> 20-credit NSC subjects.
- Life Orientation (LO) is excluded as it is a10-credit NSC subject .
- You MUST include the % obtained for the following <u>3 fundamental</u> <u>subjects</u>: 1) Home language; 2) 1st Add. Language; and 3) Maths; or Maths Lit; or Technical Maths.

• If you have 8 or more subjects:

Add the % obtained in your 3 fundamental subjects (2 languages + Maths, or Maths Lit, or Tech Maths), plus the % for any subject(s) required, together with the % for your next highest subject(s), to a maximum of six subjects.

• Applicants from a **<u>quintile 1, 2 or 3 school</u>** who attain 50% or higher for Life Orientation (LO) - 7 points are added to their AS score out of 600 to arrive at their final score.

All SA public ordinary schools are categorised into five groups, called quintiles. Quintile 1 to 3 are non-fee paying schools, while Quintile 4 & 5 are fee paying schools.



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



- Develop coping skills





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
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

NSFAS applications for a following year are opened in the existing year in September and closes on the 30th November of that same particular

year.

If the student misses this process, it is not on the hands of institutional financial aid nor UADS departments to seek finances for that particular student.

It is always advisable that the student get to the nearest NYDA or any institution nearer, to get further guidance and assistance thereof. All possible prospective applicants are advised to logon NSFAS website www.nsfas.org.za.

They can download the ANNEXURES on line take it for assessment from the medical practitioners of their choice, scan and submit online with other documents as set by NSFAS for their applications.

They can then forward a copy to the UADS department of the institution they intend to further their studies to. Assessment of devices, including scribes and etc will be done by this department.

UADS inline with the financial aid will scan these documents and upload with registration template to the NSFAS office. That process is regarded as a claim. NSFAS will pay the university this claim accordingly.

Once these funds are received by the financial aid they get distributed in form of allocations against the student's financial statement. Institutional policies are taken into consideration in this process and comply to therefore by financial aid as well as UADS department.





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Reasonable Accommodations/ Concessions

Test and Exams concessions

- Extra-time (e.g. 15,20,30 minutes per hour)
- Separate venue
- Scribe & or reader
- Spelling concessions
- Use of Laptop/computer
- Braille and large print material
- Rest breaks
- Handwriting accommodation
- Use of personal assistant
- Medication and food intake
- Use of equipment
- Sign Language Interpretation

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Braille Office Services provided for blind and visually impaired students

- Registered students receive the relevant orientation programme, timetables, study materials in required format (enlarged or braille).
- Working closely with the various lecturers, timeframes will be set to make sure study material will be converted in time to be collected by students.
- Tests and exams: in liaison with the Exam Unit, Lecturer and Moderators exam papers are converted and printed and handled in confidentiality.

Accessible Transport

- UADS has dedicated adapted transport to qualifying students based on assessments.
- Transport services is offered to students who live on campus and accredited accommodation.
- Transport service include academic, shopping and medical trips.
- Transport is arranged three days in advance

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Coaching and mentoring

Pre-Entry Support

The focus of pre-entry support is to offer integrated services that are constituted of different divisions in the university (Student Wellness, Admissions, Marketing, Financial Aid and UADS).

Coaching and mentoring continued... <u>Post Entry Support</u>

During this phase, the student may experience high levels of anxiety associated with academic demands, feelings of isolation, emptiness, stress, homesickness and a sense of loss.

Activities

- Academic needs (Understanding time tables, Tutor, Reader, Note taker etc)
- Difference between Supplemental Instruction and Individual Academic Support)
- Learning Styles
- Effective study techniques
- Form study Teams/ learning communities
- Evaluation of student support needs
- Listening to the voice of students (Society) establishment)
- Self-advocacy skills (how to create Podcast, You Tube etc.)
- Organisational skills (best tools)

Exit Support

The focus of exit support is to help students prepare for this next phase of life. Being prepared for the labour market will ease the transition.

Activities

- Presentation skills
- Life skills
- Sighted Guide skills
- Work shadowing (AREP)
- Interview Skills
- Connect on networking sites

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Student Responsibility

It is a student's responsibility to:

- Meet Academic Requirements and Conduct Standards: Students with disability get no special treatment because they have a disability. They are also required to follow the conduct standards of the university as all other students do.
- Request the assistance of the UADS and to provide any documentation of conditions that may warrant academic accommodations.
